

## CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

#### **How Can I Keep from Singing**

Yesterday was the feast of Corpus Christi, The Body and Blood of Christ. Yesterday was also the 77th anniversary of AA. I celebrated the day as a feast of a double first class. First, the Eucharist, not only the sacrament I am privileged to confect (bring into being), but also the food for me on my sojourn through life and onto eternal life. The second, AA and working the 12 steps, has given me a course correction on my journey of life. This message will focus on the Eucharist.

Our group in Las Vegas observe a holy hour once a month on the First Friday of the Month. At my request my pastor has assigned me to the 8 am mass on the First Friday where Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament takes place at the end of Mass. I also minister to the reposition at 12 noon. At eleven o'clock our Calix group meets in church where we enact an hour of prayer. We say the scripture rosary, the chaplet of Divine Mercy, followed by a homily delivered by myself, and usually on devotion to the Blessed Sacrament This is followed by the liturgy of Benediction. What is amazing and edifying to me are the number of

men and women not associated with Calix who come to church for the holy hour. Sometimes, we have had as many as two hundred people attend this service, other times fifty, with an average of about one hundred twenty five. At the end of the Benediction it is around twelve noon, and the church bells are tolling the Angelus. I give a brief history of the Angelus, and then together we recite the beautiful ancient prayer, recalling the grace filled time Mary and Elizabeth exchanged greetings. I have placed this Eucharistic Devotion at the center of our Calix being, as I see it as a faith anchor, and it keeps us from focusing on ways to attract new members as our purpose of being.

A priest friend of mine was at one time chaplain to a large convent on the East Coast. He recalled to me a time in the 1980's, during the cold war, the story of two Catholic Nuns who were trapped in Bulgaria when the Iron Curtain fell on that country. For forty some years they were forced to live a secular life style, sharing an apartment, and working in a government run company. In 1990 they were given visas and permission to visit the United States. The convent where my friend was chaplain hosted them. Upon arriving at the convent, their first request was to spend the first twenty four hours in continuous adoration before the Blessed Sacrament in the perpetual adoration chapel. Father Benedict Groeschel, C.F.R. has a devotion powerful book on the Blessed Sacrament entitled " Presence of Our Lord" Matt Talbot centered his spiritual life on Fr. Bill (cont. on pg. 2)

devotion to the Eucharist. Today in my opinion the daily news on all levels is news of unspeakable human behavior. I encourage people to develop a devotion to the Eucharist, Daily Mass, reception of frequent communion not just as a means of deepening their love of God, but also as a means to renew their hope and sense of joy. .. This leads me back to the title of this article. How can I keep from singing? The first stanza of a beautiful spiritual hymn dating to 1868 reads. " MY LIFE FLOWS ON IN ENDLESS SONG; ABOVE EARTH'S LAMENTATION, i HEAR THE SWEET, THO' FAR OFF HYMN. THAT HAILS A NEW CREATION; I HEAR THE MUSIC RINGING; IT FINDS AN ECHO IN MY SOUL--HOW CAN I KEEP FROM SINGING? After all isn't that what Christ and the Apostles did at the conclusion of the supper in the upper room? They sang a hymn!

## Calix Board of Directors Appoints Fr William C. Associate Chaplain

On February 2, 2012, the Calix Board of Director's voted to appoint, Fr. William Cawley of the York Group to the position of Associate Chaplain of The Calix Society. He will serve in assistance to Fr Tom G. It is my pleasure to introduce to the Calix Society Membership my priest, my spiritual guide, and my friend.

Fr. Bill was born to Walter James and Corinne J. Cawley in Great Falls, Montana on November 21, He attended The Pontifical College Josephinum in Worthington, Ohio, and he was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Great Falls -Billings on June 16, 1973. While completing an aftercare experience as a hospital chaplain at St. Vincent's Hospital in Billings, Montana, Fr. Bill was granted a leave of absence from the Great Falls Diocese to continue his ministry in service to the people of the Harrisburg Diocese. Fr. Bill took a teaching position at York Catholic High School in York Pennsylvania in 1988. The temporary assignment became more or less a permanent one. He is presently finishing his final semester at York Catholic, and will be entering his retirement as the school year ends. Fr. Bill has been in residence and an Associate Pastor at St. Patrick's Catholic Church in York where our Calix Group meets. He plans to remain in residence at St. Patrick's to assist in the parish and at York Catholic and in his home diocese as this new phase of his life begins.

I met Fr. Bill, by accident or more accurately by Divine Providence. He was the celebrant at Mass one Sunday morning and the strangest thing happened. He was saying things in his homily that I hear in the rooms of AA – we do have some "notable" sayings in AA. I introduced myself after Mass, and started to attend meetings with him. We started having more frequent conversations, and I began to share with him my displeasure with some of the AA groups in the area for not allowing the Lord's Prayer. One day, he asked me to his car, where he produced a copy of The Chalice. That's how we began having conversations about starting a Calix Group in York.

The more we learned about one another, the strangest thing became evident: June 7th. That date is the date of Matt Talbot's death, Fr. Bill's

sobriety, is common to Matt Talbot, Fr. Bill and me. June 7th and my birthday. How much clearer did the Holy Spirit have to make this for us? Shortly thereafter, we invited some people we knew to a formation meeting to discuss starting a Calix Group. We had our first official Calix meeting on the second Saturday of September in 2006.

Since our start, Fr. Bill has been agreeable, and we've added our second monthly meeting. Fr. Bill was in attendance at the recent Pittsburgh and Philadelphia Calix Conventions where many of you may have met him. We are so blessed in York to have Fr. Bill. His nature as an educator has resulted in some wonderful learning opportunities for us and we are proud to share him with the rest of Calix. I am confident that the Society will soon learn why I am so fond of him. Please join me in thanking Fr. Bill for his willingness to serve our Society, and pray that we have him for many years to come.

# PRESIDENT'S COLUMN By Ken Johnston

#### Are You Enthusiastic?

I kept waiting for an idea to come to me for this edition of The Chalice and nothing. As a result I'm late in getting this to our wonderful secretary, Jim B., which is why this is probably late getting to you! And as usually happens, when it rains it pours!

On a normal Saturday morning I was stopping at the local convenience store around 6:00 AM to pick up creamer and donuts for my Saturday morning men's prayer group at my parish. When I came out I noticed a gentleman really rubbing a small spot on what looked like a pretty new and expensive car. The car looked like it had just been washed and waxed, shining from a short distance. But there must have been something on there that he just had to get off.

Then the thought came to me: did this man (ME!) worry about the last stain (i.e. sin) on his soul as much as he (ME!) worried about that little spot on the hood of his car? Having read Step Five in Fr. Lugar's "Calix and the Twelve Steps" at our unit meeting just a few days prior, I also recalled a couple lines with a similar message. Fr. Lugar writes: "My own experience in administering the Sacrament of Penance has been that its preparation has been too cursory. People generally are concerned only with what they consider serious sin. How much more beneficial to the average Catholic would this Sacrament be, if he would earnestly pursue not just the area of serious guilt but also those many, many defects to Christian living which impede any real spiritual progress. "

Since then I have been spending some time thinking about past confessions. Were they too general? Were they focused on the more significant "sins" while leaving the less significant sins out, rationalizing that God knows what they are. Am I just being lazy in my preparation? If nothing else it gave me food for thought!

The other idea that came to mind that I thought worth sharing was a lesson I learned in a recent homily. In speaking of the apostle's enthusiasm our priest told us of the root of the word enthusiasm...from the Greek "entheos" or "having a god within". As we went through the Easter season, we would read of the apostles' fear and doubt. Two thousand years later we ask ourselves how they

could have felt this way since, after all, they had just spent three years with Jesus. Shouldn't they have figured it out on their own?

But it was the Pentecost event, the coming of the Holy Spirit, that not only removed fear and doubt but allowed the men (and women – Mary was there, right!) to go out and proclaim the gospel and convert many, sometimes thousands at a time!

So this brought another question for me, and I offer it to you: how enthusiastic are we to bring the gospel to others? And not only to those in recovery, but our family, our friends, our co-workers? If we aren't, could it be that there are still things in us that prevent God from taking up residence in us? Could this be what makes us less than enthusiastic at times?

As we approach the feast of the Sacred Heart, to which the Philadelphia units have dedicated themselves, I think it's a great time to ponder how much of our hearts we have given over to God and how much of our heart still clings to our old ways. In terms of the 12 steps how many of our character defects have we allowed God to act on, and how many do we hold onto, rationalizing that some of them are actually beneficial? For me and I'm sure for others - there are times that I think I have come so far from my old way of life. And at other times I must admit that I have not come very far at all, certainly not as far as I would have liked. The one saving grace is that with His grace I have the opportunity to continue to avail myself of that grace, and with His aid I can continue on the Calix path. I pray that all of you will continue on this path and ask others "to join with us in prayer for our stated purposes".

sober walk, he became a convert to Catholicism. His brother had previously become Catholic and was in the process of being ordained a priest when Mike became Catholic.


